

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

Juraj Jánošík

- bandit, Slovak national hero
- died in 1713 hanged on the hook
- legend about Jánošík
- heroic qualities: strength, courage and bravery

Francisco



- a member of the Hungarian Diet
- codified the Slovak language
- national revivalist, politician, linguist, teacher, writer, and a journalist
- death: 1856, shot in the thigh







Milan Rastislav Štefánik

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- an astronomer (interests: observing the Sun eclipse)
- a politician, General of the French army, organizer of the East Front leg
- co-founder of the Czechoslovakia, the first Czechoslovak Minister of W
- death: plane crash in 1919



The Barrow of Milan Rastislav Štefánik (Brezová pod Bradlom)




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On the St. Andrew's day (30th November), girls used to divine the names of their future husbands from lead.
